OUTINGS

A FULL DAY'S VISIT TO TWO INTERESTING MUSEUMS

Monday, October 9th

We will depart from the Bus Station at 9.00 am and the cost for the whole day, including museum tours, your lunch and transport is £24.00

In the morning we are visiting The People's History Museum in Spinningfields, Manchester where we will have a guided tour and then our lunch. After lunch we go to The Jewish Museum in Cheetham Hill.

The People's History Museum defines itself as the National Museum of Democracy. First opening in Manchester in the 1980s, it received significant funding and reopened in its new modern building in 2010. It holds the largest collection of political material in Britain and a hugely varied range of objects. The core of the collection covers the fight for the vote from the early 19th century through to the suffragettes and the lowering of the voting age to 18 in 1969. They have a collection of political banners which is the largest in the world and a huge collection of political posters and more!

In the afternoon we have a much requested repeat visit to the Jewish Museum, which occupies a former large Spanish Synagogue on Cheetham Hill – a Grade II listed building. After the synagogue closed due to the migration of people away from the area it re-opened as a museum in 1984, telling the story of the history of Jewish settlement in Manchester and its community over the last 200 years. We will have an introductory talk before viewing the Museum's fascinating collection. We should return to the bus station by 4.30 pm.



A report on the U3A visit to Birmingham Jewellery Quarter & Birmingham Canals

On 6 September Knutsford U3A visited the Jewellery Quarter Museum where, in 1899, Mr Smith and his uncle Mr Pepper set up their jewellery business in Birmingham in an area known as the Jewellery Quarter in adjoining buildings, Nos: 78 and 79 Vyse Street. Their company became known around the

world and traded from these premises until 1981. The Museum has preserved the 'time capsule' workshop and also tells the story of the Jewellery Quarter and the ancient craft skills still practised in workshops that make this area the centre of the British jewellery industry.

Our guide, Steve, brought the Museum to life with demonstrations and descriptions of the workers around the 'peg' (the kidney-shaped benches where



After our visit we went for a spot of lunch at the various local cafes in the area and then joined up to take a trip along the Birmingham Canals.

Birmingham is at the hub of the country's canal network. There are 35 miles (56 km) of canals within the city, of which most are navigable. Birmingham is often described



as having more miles of canal than Venice. This is technically correct as Venice has 26 miles.





We experienced the Industrial Heritage of Birmingham from our very comfortable seats on the canal boat, a running commentary accompanied our trip.

Several members of Knutsford U3A attended U3A Summer Schools this year. The following accounts highlight different people's experiences of these Summer Schools but all seem to be in agreement that the Summer School experience is a valuable and interesting one.

U3A North West Region's Summer School 2017

I thoroughly enjoyed the residential summer school at Newton Rigg Agricultural College, in the delightful Cumbrian countryside; purpose built student accommodation surrounded by delightful gardens and attended by a record number of NW U3A members.

Five members of Knutsford U3A joined the summer school studying such varied topics as Architecture, Russian and Soviet culture and Ukulele for beginners, with lots of other courses available to choose from. Notwithstanding a definite drop in temperature, having left Cheshire in Summer, we arrived in Cumbria in what could only be described as a very chilly Autumn, however we soon acclimatised and added layers of warmer clothes.

Everyone was warm and friendly and I met some interesting people in a relaxed setting. Our lecturer on the Architecture course was excellent, guiding us through our built environment, from Classical to Gothic, the Georgian to the modern, with just the right amount of knowledge combined with humour.

The student accommodation on the campus was basic but adequate; however the locally sourced food was delicious. An evening trip to the Theatre by the Lake in Keswick was very enjoyable and our visit to Carlisle Cathedral to explore Early English Architecture fascinating.

A very enjoyable time was had by all and I heartily recommend it.

U3A Summer School, Royal Agricultural University, Cirencester, 14th – 17th August 2017

This year's summer school adopted a similar four-day programme structure to previous years. Such is the popularity of these summer schools that three were run this year (previously two.) There were 7 topics being tutored on the week I was there, ranging from Garden History to Singing for Pleasure, the class I attended.

The University and its grounds provided impressive with comfortable accommodation for participants and the opportunity to have three good cooked meals a day was too much of a temptation for many. I was made welcome from the minute I arrived and staff or students were on hand to show participants to their rooms and assist with luggage if needed. I chose to drive down but those that travelled by rail were met at the local station and transported to the University. The administrators also organised shared taxis for their return journey.



On the first evening, we were provided with a welcome drink before dinner. Drinks, dinner and an afterdinner quiz provided a good opportunity to meet others, including tutors, to get an insight into the range of courses being run. The Garden History tutor told me that she learnt as much from the students as they did from her...a good example of U3A principles in practice! Seminars were held from 9.00am through to 4.45pm with morning and afternoon coffee/tea breaks and 90 minutes for lunch. Entertainment was provided after dinner on the second evening by the Dave Ayre Trio; three highly-talented, freelance musicians playing a collection of jazz pieces from around the world.

On the last evening, we were provided with a formal farewell dinner. The closing speeches were kept short and started when the puddings had been served which meant that people could get away to socialise in the bar or, for many, to listen to the Singing for Pleasure Group perform some of their repertoire in the University's Chapel.

This was one of the highlights for me as, at the beginning of the week, I had offered to lead the Group in a warm-up session with a song, called "The Power in Me" which has simple words and actions. This song has been rewritten by the Knutsford U3A Social Singing Group to have three verses, each reflecting one word of the U3A strap line, "Learn, Laugh and Live!" The Group and the Tutor loved this song and joined in the actions with great vigour. Later in the week, the U3A National Executive Committee Chairman, Pam Jones, dropped in to visit our class unexpectedly and the tutor asked me to lead "The Power in Me" for her. Pam was most impressed and threatened to adopt the song as the U3A anthem! Well, after that there was no turning back and we performed the song at the evening concert. With 40 singers and many more in the audience all joining in with the chorus and actions we raised the roof!

On the last day, we were given a few simple songs that could be photocopied and used in our own singing groups and invited to perform to the rest of the group. Several people volunteered including a group of ukulele players! For most of the session there wasn't a dry eye in the house - mostly from sheer hilarity. The performances ranged from Hinge and Bracket style piano duets to heart-wrenching performances eg husband and wife saying/singing "You Don't Bring Me Flowers Anymore". What a great way to end a fabulous summer school experience.....highly recommended and we certainly did learn, laugh and live!
