## **Committee Member Profile**



## **Mark Barley**

I was born in Lincoln, but brought up in the south of England: Beds/Bucks and Essex. After a degree in Cambridge and eight years studying and working in North America, I moved in 1987 to the North West to join the chemicals company ICI at Runcorn, living initially in Chester. Later, after marrying Laura, we moved to Bowdon where we have lived ever since.

Our son David was born in 1997 and I left ICI in 2006 and took up a short-term research contract at Manchester University. In 2013 my contract came to an end and I thought I was taking early retirement. I had heard

of the u3a movement and was keen to learn some geology, which I had enjoyed at school. At the time Knutsford had a very active geology group under Fred Owen's leadership and they met once a month on a Monday evening at the Angel so I joined Knutsford u3a despite it not being my closest u3a. I was also active in other groups; I remember doing walks with Rod Howgate.

I was still applying for research contracts with Manchester University and at the end of 2013 I was offered a four year contract which kept me employed up to 2017 when I did finally retire. However, I kept up with the u3a geology through all this time, eventually leading the group for a couple of years prior to 2020. At about the same time Colin Bowman suggested that I join the main u3a committee which I did. When Christine Jones (the chair of the committee at the time) was looking for someone to take over that role, I said I would consider it if I could be vice chair first. This was arranged and I ended up taking over the role of chair just after the start of the pandemic. Chairs are limited by the constitution to one term of three years, so when my term was up in 2023, I was fortunate to be able to do a job swap with Sue Allan so she is now chair and I'm secretary. Laura and I continue to greatly enjoy geology and wine group 1, and I'm active in a couple of walking groups and the family history group.

I will finish by asking that every member gets as involved with the u3a as they are able to. We are a volunteer led organisation so we need people to step forward and lead; whether it is within an activity group, or by joining the committee. I found that having a period as vice chair helped massively to prepare me for a role for which I had had no previous experience. Please give it a try!

## **Tour of Bridgewater Hall – (and lunch)**

The Bridgewater Hall, built 26 years ago as a 'state of the art' concert hall, is a building filled with hidden features and surprising facts. On this guided tour we will see many areas normally off limits to the public, and hear about the careful planning that makes the superb acoustics of the hall.



You will see how the whole 22,500 ton construction has no rigid contact with its foundations. Instead, the whole concrete structure is supported by earthquake-proof giant springs, which ensure no external vibrations mar the acoustics in the hall. I have been told the sight of these springs is unforgettable!

Hopefully, we will also learn about the amazing, enormous organ and hear much more about the design of the whole building.

The whole tour takes about an hour and a half and includes a climb beneath the building to explore the undercroft.

Following on from the tour we have a three minute walk around the outside of the hall to the Rain Bar pub.

Here we will have a simple sandwich lunch (though I have been promised chips!) with tea or coffee. Other drinks can be purchased from the bar.



The Hepworth Gallery is an award -winning art gallery, opened in 2011, overlooking the River Calder in Wakefield. We bought Christmas tree decorations and presents. Near the Christmas market there is an ice rink where you can skate and play curling!

After lunch we took a walk across the bridge and in the evening, we found ourselves in a nice Italian restaurant where we ate well and talked about the day.

The weather during our entire trip was sunny with blue skies, no wind, everything was very pleasant.

The next morning after breakfast we went into town to do some shopping. During the war Cologne was almost completely flattened. The cathedral and only a few buildings remained, so most of the buildings are new today. However, the city is good, the shops are nice, all the goods are of good quality and the streets are full of people shopping. While we were out and about, we visited another Christmas market to eat 'Wurst' and drink mulled wine. Very tasty and good.

Far too soon we had to go home again. The taxi to the hotel came to take us to the airport. After a short flight we were back in Manchester after a nice trip. Everyone enjoyed the trip very much and maybe we will all come back next year

## Walking Group 1

Our last walk of 2024, on Monday 9 December was from Piccadilly Basin in Manchester City Centre.

There were 12 members, one dropping out due to illness. Tom, Sue and I arrived early by car and had no problem parking in the surface car park on Dale Street, opposite a Premier Inn. We took advantage of our early arrival to buy coffee inside the hotel at the breakfast bar, and were fortunate enough to be given Danish Pastries and Croissants free of charge, as the waiter said breakfast was coming to a close.

Others members came by Metro or train and once we were all assembled, passed through the Basin and marvelled at the size it had once been during its heyday. After learning about the history of the Basin, when it was used by The Rochdale Canal Company, we moved off over the bridge to join the towpath of the canal, where we stopped briefly to take a look at the 200 year-old, 8-storey Cotton Mills, now converted into apartments and businesses.

Crossing the three-way bridge, we entered New Islington Marina that had been constructed from the former local authority Cardroom Estate, which had been built in the 1970s, after the cotton slums had been cleared in the previous decade. By 2000 the Estate was a deprived place, losing its pubs, shops and eventually the local primary school. By 2006 the estate had been razed to the ground to make way for what is now a much sortafter location in the heart of the city, with two to four-bedroomed family homes with gardens, sitting alongside businesses, cafes, canal barges and narrow boats moored in the Marina.

Transferring to the Ashton Canal towpath, we walked by modern low-rise developments back into the city centre and made our way over to Granby Row, where we learnt about the much-loved Manchester-born soft drink, Vimto. Originally sold under the name Vim Tonic, as a health tonic, it was concocted by John Noel in 1908. then re-registered as a cordial in 1913. An oak monument was commissioned in 1992 to sit at the site of its creation, but weathered by years of wind and rain, it was restored in 2011.

A little further on, we stopped at the statue built in memory of Alan Mathison Turing, close to where he worked at The University of Manchester, following his work with the British Intelligence Service at Bletchley Park during WW11. He had lived his later years in Wilmslow.

Moving on, we admired the red brick Victorian warehouse buildings on our way to lunch at a local pub in Ancoats.

We had been lucky to have dry weather, even if it was a little chilly. An interesting short walk and reasonably priced food (for Manchester!) on the lunch menu. One to be repeated.
